

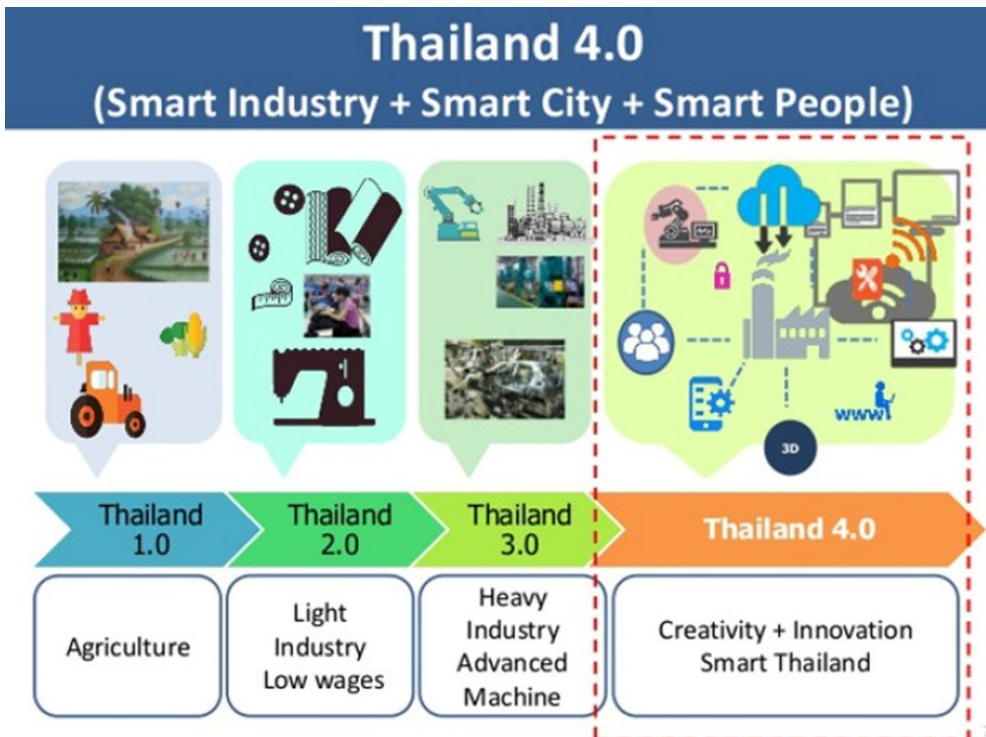

What is Thailand 4.0?

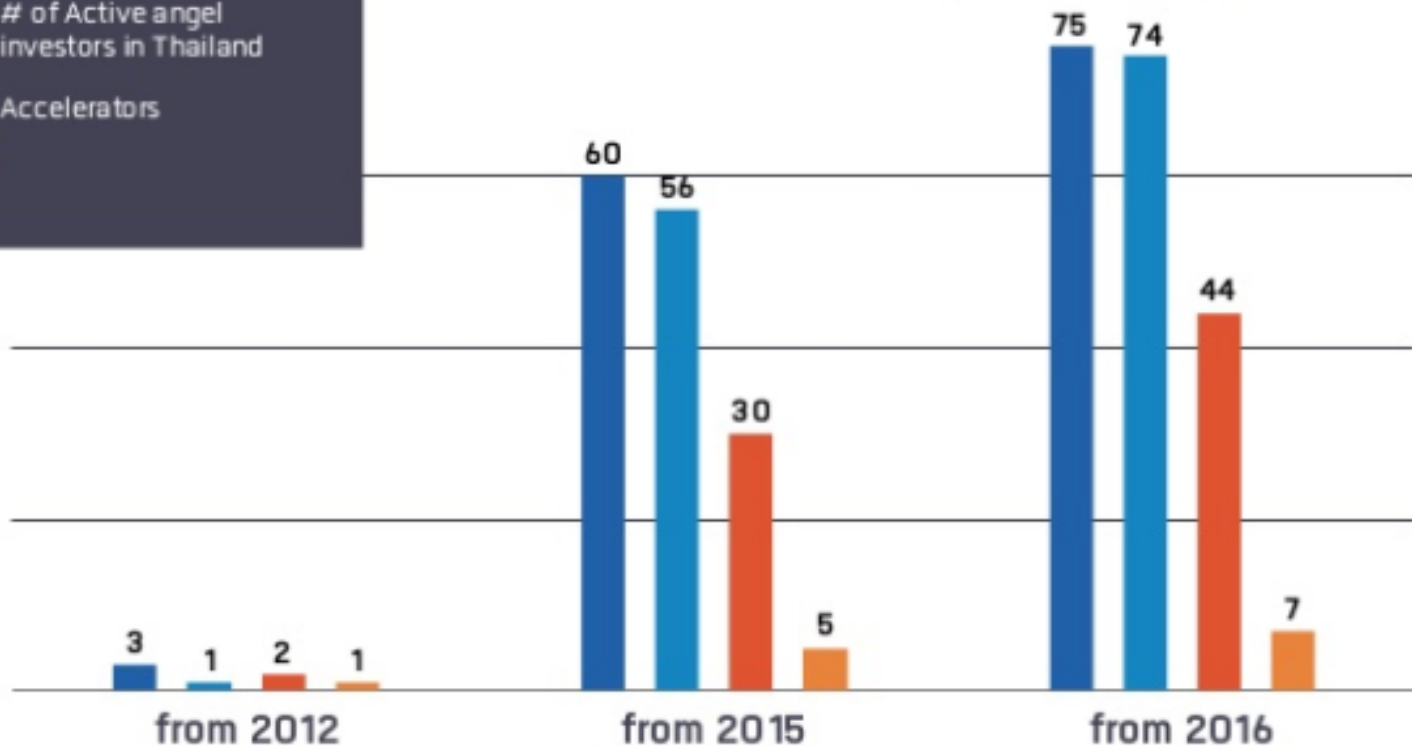

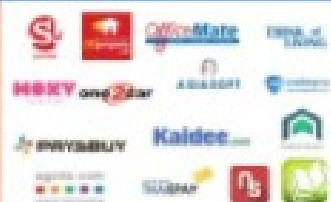

TERMS OF REFERENCE

ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Council (AYEC)

Preamble

Whereas the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) has given its recognition and acknowledgement on the issue of young entrepreneurs through the adoption of the Bandar Seri Begawan Declaration on Youth Entrepreneurship and Employment at the 23rd ASEAN Summit, in October 2013.

Whereas the reduction of youth unemployment to half by 2015 has been one of the goals of all Member States of the United Nations, of which all ASEAN Member States are signatories to, to attain the Millennium Development Goals.

Whereas the inclusion of youth and the fostering of young entrepreneurship would not only reduce the unemployment rate, but also boost the overall economic growth and sustainability of the region.

The ASEAN Business Advisory Council (ASEAN-BAC), through its Working Group on Young Entrepreneurs, and the endorsement from ASEAN Economic Ministers on the 12th AEM and ASEAN-BAC Consultation in Nay Pyi Taw, Myanmar on the 28th of August 2014, therefore, established the ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Council (AYEC) at 20 November 2015 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia with the primary objective of establishing an ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association (AYEA) in the near future. The AYEA would be established with the purpose of complementing ASEAN's effort to promote and support young entrepreneurship to ensure sustainable economic development in the region.

Purpose and objectives

The purpose and objectives of the establishment of ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Council are:

- (1) To develop a Charter / Constitution to serve as a legal foundation of the ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association;
- (2) While laying the foundation for the eventual founding of the AYEA, AYEC will in parallel also continue to discuss possible opportunities to develop, expand and act upon opportunities for cross border cooperation and communication for ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs;
- (3) To explore Action Plan Strategies for sustainable development and growth of the ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association; and
- (4) To identify growth and expansion plans or strategies for the ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association.
- (5) To maintain and to be represented on the Joint Consultation Meeting of ASEAN+1 Business Councils on behalf of ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association.



Meetings and timeline

(1) Call for a Meeting

The Council Members shall meet at least once every six (6) months for a Council Meeting, a fourteen (14) day notice of each meeting shall be issued by the Secretary to the members. The Chair, or at least seven (7) Council Members, may call for a Council Meeting through a written notification to the Secretary, requesting the calling of such Council Meetings and the presentation of the agenda to be discussed in the said Meeting. Subsequently, the Secretary shall issue a notice of at least fourteen (14) days to all Council Members. At least six (6) countries represented by their respective Council Members must be present at the Council Meeting for its proceedings to be considered valid and to constitute a quorum.

(2) Timeline

- The ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Council shall finalise the the Charter / Constitution of the ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association by the end of 2015/beginning of 2016;
- The ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Council shall finalise the Action Plan / Strategy for Sustainable Development and Growth of ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association by end of 2015/beginning of 2016;
- The ASEAN Young Entrepreneurs Association (AYEA) shall be formally established by the year of 2016.

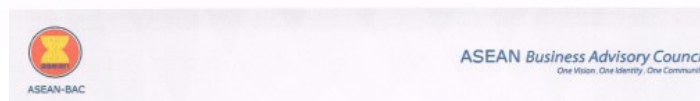

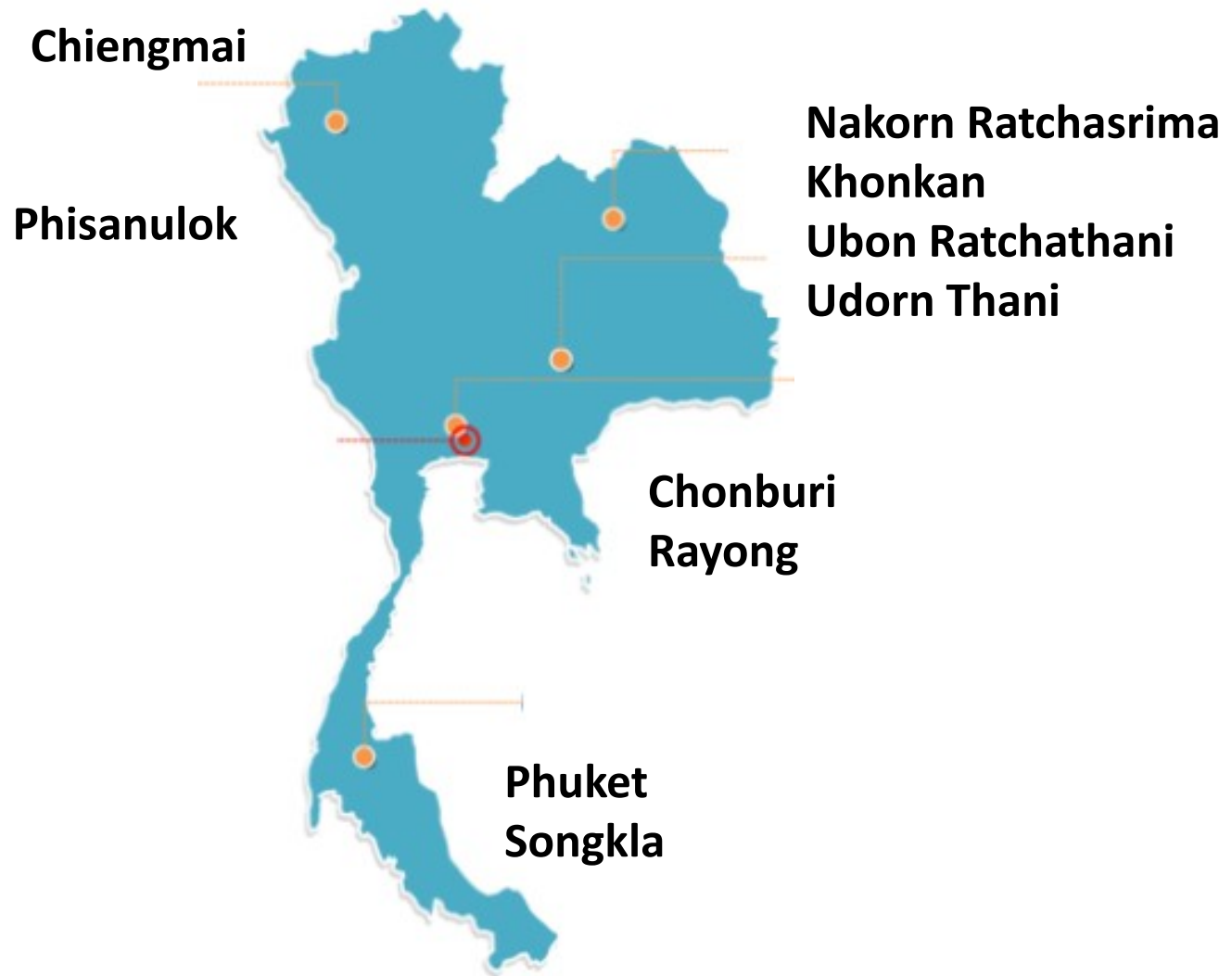
